MINUTES

1. Welcome

Ethan Dunstan called the meeting to order at 10:10 AM.

2. Roll Call

A roll call was performed, as noted above.

3. Public Comment

No public comment was made or submitted at the meeting.

4. Approve Meeting Minutes

Tom Click made a motion to accept the Meeting Minutes of the November 15, 2022 Entrepreneurship Task Force, as presented. Rob Archer seconded the motion. Motion carried.

5. Grant Proposal Discussion: Food and Beverage Business Accelerator

Four people scored the proposal, with an average of 85. By the time of the Council meeting there will be a few updates to the budget and in-kind forms. This proposal team will likely be at the meeting as they are presenting on the Rural Entrepreneurship Ecosystem project and REI project. Six letters of support were presented, and Shannon asked the project team to clarify the size of those companies, as they are used to validate the project need. She has also asked for the source of data to be shared.

Ethan Dunstan said the proposal needs more clarity, and to elaborate on statements like "challenges unique to the food industry" and explain how this grant will mitigate those concerns. Match forms should also be more transparent, with hourly rates showed for calculations.

Tom Click critiqued the ambiguity of scaling, which the project team needs to clarify. The project also needs to explain why the chosen staff is the best path forward rather than a consultant. The project should also assert that this will allow businesses to stay and grow in Region 9, or at least Virginia.

Rob Archer asked the project to consider scaling, so this effort can be replicated in other regions. It should generate a model that other projects can follow.

6. REI Plan - DRAFT

The draft REI report was received on October 15th. There is also an action plan that is in draft form – to be delivered. It may take a few months to complete.

Shannon cited potential issues with the report:

- Reads like an ESO strategic plan vs an entrepreneur focused plan
- Recommendations (such as 1,2) add more infrastructure when resources are tight for ESOs
- Many of the recommendations have GO Virginia as a possible funder but are not in alignment with funding abilities
- Lacks strong connection to our target traded sectors or even high growth sectors
- First two recommendations seem redundant with the Rural Entrepreneurship Ecosystem Building activities

Members agreed the report lacks focus and seems to lack validation from entrepreneurs. Tom Click added that it does not address the unique challenges of rural ecosystems. The Task Force recommended that any action be deferred to the January Council meeting.

The Regional Entrepreneurship Initiative (REI) report, completed in fall 2024, identified nine key recommendations to strengthen Central Virginia's entrepreneurial ecosystem. Based on extensive research and stakeholder engagement, these recommendations provide a framework for fostering innovation, supporting business growth, and enhancing regional collaboration.

This action plan outlines the pre-implementation phase (December 2024 - June 2025) and potential implementation strategies for each recommendation. At this stage, we have identified five major initiatives (Recommendations 1, 3, 4, 7, and 8) that could be strong candidates for GO Virginia implementation funding. The remaining recommendations (2, 5, 6, and 9) are envisioned as smaller-scale projects that could be implemented through leveraged resources from regional partners and smaller investment by Go Virginia.

The proposed projects and budgets outlined in this document represent initial concepts that will be refined as we work with our partners and further develop the grant application(s). Venture Central is committed to supporting the highest and best use of resources in Central Virginia; therefore, we will share proposals with existing entrepreneur support organizations that may have an interest in projects prior to submitting funding applications.

The pre-implementation phase focuses on securing stakeholder commitments, developing the GO Virginia implementation grant application, and establishing baseline metrics. Following application in March and state approval in June 2025, implementation will proceed with dedicated initiatives designed to create measurable economic impact through job creation, capital access, and ecosystem development across the region.

Pre-Implementation Phase (2024 - June 2025)

December 2024

- Schedule and prepare briefs for January meetings with all Region 9 municipalities to discuss priorities and interest levels
- Schedule January meetings with ESOs to discuss possible leadership roles in implementing the recommendations
- Begin outlining implementation grant application for March 2025

January 2025

- Hold meetings as per above
- Hold group meeting with committed ESO partners
- Secure written commitments from ESO partners
- Begin budget planning and implementation framework with partner input

Q1 2025 (Feb-March)

- Submit consolidated GO Virginia implementation grant application (March 19 deadline)
- Create project management structure across all recommendations and establish baseline metrics for all initiatives, with a focus on GoVirginia Region 9 priorities.

Q2 2025 (April-June)

- April 16 anticipated local approval of grant application
- June 10 anticipated state approval
